
Sick person's world



Core Essences of Spiritual Caring (2)

1. Right preparation
2. **Right attitude**
 - be respectful and humble – expect to learn from the patient
 - do not lie
 - do not force the truth on a patient in denial
 - include the family and staff in your circle of care



Sadhu Sundar Singh (1889-1929)

Sundar was raised a Sikh and so had studied intently the holy book of the Sikh religion, the Granth Sahib, and also the holy Hindu sacred book, the Gita. His piety even as a child was known throughout the region.

Sundar's mother died when he was just a teenager, and her death threw the young man into overwhelming grief. He railed at God, even publicly burning the Bibles of the Christian missionaries in the area.

Sadhu Sundar Singh (1889-1929)

Finally, Sundar's despair led him to plan his own death. For three days and nights he stayed in his room. "If God wants me to live, let him say so," he exclaimed. "Oh God, if there be a God, reveal yourself to me tonight."

His plan was simple and carefully thought out: if God did not speak to him before morning, he would go out to the railway line, lay his head on the rails, and wait in the darkness for the 5am train from Ludhiana to end his misery.

Sadhu Sundar Singh (1889-1929)

For seven hours he waited in silent meditation. At 4.45am, witnesses Sundar, a bright cloud of light suddenly filled his room and out of the brightness came the face and figure of Jesus.

Sadhu Sundar Singh (1889-1929)

Sundar had been expecting Krishna or one of his own gods, not Jesus. Yet, he was certain it was Jesus. He spoke to Sundar in Hindustani: "How long are you going to persecute me? I died for you. For you I gave my life. You were praying to know the right way; why don't you take it? I am the Way."

As a result of this vision, Sundar's life was dramatically and irrevocably changed and he was led into one of the most remarkable ministries of the twentieth century.
